# **Background**

The European Union has confirmed its unequivocal commitment to the EU membership perspective of the Western Balkans and has called for an accelerated accession process and further advancement of gradual integration. The need for accelerated reforms and economic initiatives expected to benefit the citizens directly and help enhance GDP per capita in PP in the region to match the EU average are in the focus of the most recent policy instrument in this field – reform agendas for the WB Growth Plan. The foundation of the process still lies in the respective Stabilisation and Association Agreements, market integration and alignment with the body of EU law. The prospect of EU membership is an incentive to bring forward and step up with the reforms in the Western Balkans, mostly related to the political and economic governance, the fight against corruption, public administration reform, the rule of law and media freedoms and supported by available financial instruments.

The European Union's role as a global actor is enshrined in its treaties, exercised through a wideranging external action framework. Cluster 6 - External Relations encompasses two distinct but interlinked negotiation chapters: Chapter 30: External Relations and Chapter 31: Common Foreign, Security and Defence Policy (CFSP/CSDP). These chapters form the cornerstone of the EU's external engagement, including its trade policy, development cooperation, humanitarian aid, diplomatic representation, restrictive measures (sanctions), and joint foreign and security actions.

The Cluster 6 Training Module is the continuation of the training modules on negotiation clusters designed and developed by ReSPA to help improve the administrative capacities of the negotiation structures in the Western Balkans. It is designed to suit the needs of public servants working in ministries/ departments for European integration and line ministries (economy, trade, foreign affairs, defence and interior) and independent agencies in these fields that are part of negotiation structures in Cluster 6. The training will focus on some of the main challenges in relation to negotiating and aligning with these complex chapters in order to get a comprehensive understanding of the steps that need to be taken to move toward the closure of the cluster. The participants of the program are to learn about the state of the art in each chapter under this cluster, the most recent trends and techniques concerning accession negotiations and further develop skills through exchange with experts in the field. This is an opportunity for civil servants to exchange with peers, connect with their counterparts in the region and engage in discussions with trainers and lecturers.
